

## State Election - 1915.

At legal meetings of the inhabitants of the City of Beverly, in the County of Essex, and Commonwealth of Massachusetts, qualified as the law directs, holden at the several polling places designated and appointed by the Board of Aldermen, for the respective voting precincts, in said City, on the second day of November, being the Tuesday after the first Monday of said month, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifteen for the purpose of giving in their ballots for

A Governor; a Lieutenant Governor; a Secretary; a Treasurer; an Auditor and an Attorney General of the Commonwealth; also a Councillor for District Number Five, and a Senator for the Second Essex District; also for two Representatives in the General Court from the Twentieth Essex District; also for a District Attorney for the Eastern District; also for a Sheriff, a County Treasurer, a County Commissioner, one Associate Commissioner for the County of Essex.

Also to give in their votes by ballot on the question Shall the proposed amendment to the constitution, empowering the general court to authorize the taking of land to relieve congestion of population and to provide homes for citizens be approved and ratified? (Chap. 129, Resolved 1915)

Also to give in their votes by ballot on the question Shall the following proposed amendment to the constitution, enabling women to vote, be approved and ratified? (Chap. 130, Resolved 1915)

Also to give in their votes by ballot on the question Shall the following proposed amendment to the constitution, relative to the taxation of incomes and the granting of reasonable exemptions, be approved and ratified? (Chap. 140, Resolved 1915)

Also to give in their votes by ballot on the question Shall an act passed by the general court in the year nineteen hundred and fifteen, authorizing the city of Beverly to pay salaries to the members of its board of aldermen be accepted? (Chap. 141, Spec. Act. 1915)
